Irv, Tim, Dave, Wayne and myself took turns turning tops for the kids. When you would use the chatter tool on the ends of the tops it would make a lot of noise and this was a good drawing card. We have two turning champions, Irv for turning the most tops and Wayne for turning the smallest tops, that were about ¹/₄ inch in size.

We need to thank Dennis Holt for loaning us his small Jet lathe for doing the turning demonstrations and also thank all of you that brought food for the noon meals and items for the raffle that helps pay for the event.

Thank you Harmon for volunteering your shop and being the demonstrator for next months meeting that will be on Thursday April 24, 2008 6:30 PM. The demonstration will be turning basic bowls from start to finish.

Back to the ZVW meeting!

Lyle passed around the roster list for people to sign as well as a get-well card to **Bill Leary**. Several other announcements were made regarding our next meeting. **Clair Ewerts**' retirement and new job were discussed with various levels of encouragement and envy. The members were not sure if the turning project Clair showed is related to his new job.



We all hope that Clair finds good use for the rolling pin. It is made of green ash from his front yard. Clair was asking about others experience in how long you have to dry wood to be confident that it will not split. Not sure he got an adequate answer.

From there the meeting moved on to the demonstration by **Dave Dunn** concerning turning of Corian as well as a method to reverse turn the bottom of pieces.

Dave turned several items while discussing the merits of Corian and where one might find some inventory if you wanted to try your hand.



Dave Dunn Presents! Gather around, come close, and listen up!

Dave started with a small piece of Corian mounted on a waste block. Dave uses doublesided fabric tape, frequently described as the mother of all tapes.

The Corian piece was to be a small dish used for spinning tops. Dave turned the topside first and then reversed the piece to finish the bottom. Dave explained how he used a small drill to mark the center of the piece through the waste block so that the finishing of the bottom could be adequately centered on the lathe.



Here Dave is turning the edge of the Corian blank. He secures the blank with a live center and a small diameter pin.

Dave comments that turning Corian requires that you not be too aggressive as the material warms up and becomes semi liquid or rubbery.

Dave turns the face of the piece. Removing the area where the live center was supporting the disc.

Again, turning material away slowly, to prevent heating.

The piece ends up being slightly concave and sanded to 400 grit. (If I remember correctly.)





Here Dave has turned the Corian blank around and is turning the bottom.

He uses a jamb chuck with some soft rubber material glued to the end. This is compressed by the tailstock and provides friction to turn the piece.

The top has been finished and sanded at this point. He turns down to a small point, and then uses a small hand grinder (Dremel) to sand off the remaining small center divot.

Dave explains how he attaches a waste block to an Osage orange wood blank.

Double sided tape and again the small drill to leave a small mark on the center of the wood piece for centering when the blank is reversed.



Dave also demonstrated turning a piece of tree lilac. This particular piece had bark and a small crack but that was not a deterrent.

Dave turned the piece to shape and then started to hollow the interior. He stressed that he starts hollowing with a small tool so as not to put too much pressure on the turning. Unfortunately at about this point, there was a small catch and the piece was knocked off center. Dave corrected and was able to continue and part off the turning.



The group does not seem to fear any flying pieces from Dave's demonstration. No one sleeping either!



For the show and tell discussion, these are tops made by **Mel Turcanik**. Count them, there are twelve tops here in one palm. Makes it easier taking product to market according to Mel.



There were a lot of show and tell items on display. From a ground effect top to turned wine glasses.



Megan Funk won the drawing for the Craft Supply certificate, with her first turning. Congratulations!
